

Identity Evropa national 'Fireside Chat' (via Discord) January 2, 2019

RUSH TRANSCRIPT:

[00:00:02] Let's begin by asking you to please mute your mics.

[00:00:07] I hope the fire truck in the background is not too loud but, yeah, please mute your mics. We've discussed having to tinker with the settings on general voice during the fireside chats to permanently mute everyone but me until we come on permanently. I don't have to do that but it seems like every fireside after repeated warnings there are still people who aren't thinking about it. So just please keep that in mind. Not the end of the world if it happens but it's something we should be able to. You should be able to muster that much competence at the very least. So anyways, I hope you had a fantastic Christmas. I hope your New Year celebrations were enjoyable and responsible. At least mostly responsible, and I hope that your new year is off to a good start. I hope you read the post that I made, the announcement that I made on New Year's and I hope to take those things to heart. I think hope that you are constantly seeking self-improvement in 2019. And we're not going to get to where we want to get to unless we are the type of people that are capable of changing the world. And it's going to take...we need ... we need to be the best versions of ourselves if we're going to accomplish that. So we know now is the time to be very honest, very critical with ourselves, in a positive way, not in a self deprecating manner. And really just look at what we need to work on.

[00:01:30] And look, there, I know there are people in this organization who are overweight. We're gonna have to talk about that.. if you know by the conference nothing changes, by the summer nothing changes. I've been kind of lax in that regard although I have talked to some people in the past but that's ... that's going to change. People expect quite a bit from Identity Evropa and we're kind of really being lax in not done, not just in the weight category as well but today if we let our standards go in general, then, you know, people lose faith in what we're building. So. White pill of the week, the government is still shut down. That is a white pill of sorts it would be great if the government didn't have to shut down in order to take care of the situation along the southern border. But that obviously is not the case. That is not where we are. And as I was saying for most of the end of November and early December as well Trump needs to fight, we need to see some fight from Donald Trump, we elected this bombastic ... bombastic guy. This is very bold, bold to a fault, author of The Art of the Deal and yes thought he was going to get a lot more done now.

[00:02:46] He's up against the adversarial judiciary, the adversarial mainstream media, the political establishment overall with the right, and the left is doing its best to thwart Donald Trump's agenda.

[00:02:57] So it's not all Trump's fault but we need to see more, we need to see him pushing back and shutting down the government was great because he's threatened to do that in the past. He threatened to certainly do all kinds of things in the past only to cave a few hours later but he didn't do it this time. That's good. The border ... rather the government remains shut down. And that is a good thing. I hope that it changes. But I think most likely scenario is that, you know, the new Congress is getting sworn in tomorrow. And I think that there's going to be, it's going to be harder for Trump to accomplish anything but, you know what, he tried, he made an effort. And, you know, the Democrats just refused to budge. They refused to budge.

[00:03:39] There was a Democratic White House aide that anonymously told Washington Post ... told the Washington Post that Trump was willing to accept 2.3 billion, I believe it was, rather than the 5.6 he originally sought. But the Democrats still refused to budge. So it'll be interesting to see how things play out, it's definitely going to be a different. A different game, so to speak, starting

tomorrow, and not for it, not for the best, but I would like to see Trump fight. Now he has... he should have no delusions about the nature of the political system in America. He should have no delusions about the way things work and what needs to be done. So if anything is going to change in America it's going to change through the presidency that is going to require a President who comes in like a wrecking ball and wields the Executive Branch the power invested in the Executive Branch like a wrecking ball. And we haven't seen that quite from Trump yet but I'm hoping that this government shutdown signifies that he is willing to move in that direction.

And you know broadcasting these things on social media is good it lets people know what's happening behind the scenes and so forth. So before we get too far into things thank you Ian for posting the merch announcement not only for posting the emerging elsewhere but handling all the marching orders. Thank you for doing that. So yeah let's get through this merch. We're gonna have new merch probably February or March and so most of the stuff here is not going to be it's stuff that basically it's dont going to be available again and we'll probably have we do have similar stickers to these and so forth. We'll probably have similar things but some of the stuff like the shirt for example is not going to be something that you can get in the future. So we'll have different shirts of course but ... buy merch its agreat way to support the organization and to get something back in return. And included within the merch category although I handle these books is Evropa books.

[00:06:23] So go to the bookstore. Check out the two books that we have. We have "Race and the American Prospect" and "Intelligence and National achievement". We're sorry you know that one is sold out. We've "Race and the American Prospect" and "Ethno politics" by Saint Francis.

[00:06:40] If you go on Amazon and you see how much recent "Race and the American Prospect" is selling for it then you look at our price you'll see that it's it's maybe 20 percent of the price that it's going for. So you're getting a rare book that contains some really insightful essays for an extremely discounted price. So this is something that's definitely valuable. Now I probably shouldn't have to say this but have you decided you want to buy 20 and and sell them on Amazon, I'm not going to sell them to you. So let's only buy these if you want to to actually read them. I've read it "Ethno Politics" it's really good. Some of you heard me talk about it a few fireside passed on haven't read "Race and the American Prospect" yet. I'm looking forward to reading through a few essays. I don't often get to read it front to back just yet but I should be getting started on that once I'm finished with what I'm reading now.

[00:07:31] But anyways keeping you guys you just as a reminder. [00:07:37] Still this lawsuit still paying 2,500 a month in basically 2,500 a month for our legal counsel and that's something that is not going to change anytime soon. [13.3] So the organization does need money. And thank you to the patrons [00:07:53] without the patrons we would not be able to function as an organization. [2.7] I am a patron you all should become patrons. The tiers are \$50, \$150, and \$300. [00:08:02] We have a different patrons server, we have [1.8] patrons voice calls where I let you guys know a little bit more what's happened behind the scenes what we've accomplished that month what we're going to be doing in upcoming months too so you guys kind of have an understanding of where your support is going.

[00:08:17] So if you're interested in becoming a patron and I would strongly encourage everyone to get involved [00:08:21] please get in touch with argument of perigee.

[00:08:24] We need your money. I need your money. [4.6] Are there a lot of fundraisers out there a lot of just stuff in the Trump world that we would like to throw our money at but there's just so much more money out in Trump World than there is in here. We need to fund...we need to make sure our money generally goes towards the "dissident right". It's kind of it's the idea between dumb money and smart money. Right. So dumb money is money that is that there is tons of right? Money that goes to the NRA. Money that goes to Trump. I'm not saying never donate to these things but we need you know smart money. Smart money is money that goes to the movement. So we need to make sure that we get as much we keep as much of that coming here as possible because these bigger causes they're going to ... they're gonna get funded they're going to get funded by people who don't really want to support us. So anyone who supports the "dissident right" should largely keep their contributions within the "dissident right". Because obviously we have a very special role to play in everything that's unfolding in American politics.

[00:09:32] So yeah please buy books. Please buy merch. Please consider becoming patron. [4.2]

[00:09:36] This organization is more than a Discord club as you know, so much administrative work that happens and without you know without being get paid people to do this stuff. And no one's making probably above minimum wage when you can't cancel it out then yeah the organization can't get by.

[00:09:53] So that is enough about that.

[00:09:57] So I was I was asked to relay a message from Carlton who can't make it tonight but you will be hearing from him on an upcoming fireside one of these weeks on but the IE literature server released an exciting announcement last night. We will be hosting and interviewing Jared Taylor for a "meet the authors" segment. [17.3]

[00:10:15] This is taking place on the IE literature server February 10th and he asked me to promote it. So I am promoting it. You guys should join the IE literature server. And looks like we're getting started. The literature server is getting started on "white identity" by Jared Taylor.

[00:10:35] Oh you are actually still haven't read that so maybe I will jump on and off to talk to Carlton but I've been meaning to participate in the Literature server for a while I've just had quite a big backlog that hasn't exactly been in line with where the Literature server was headed in terms of the books that they were reading and so forth so that's why I haven't. But yeah February 10th on the literature server. Mr Jared Taylor will be there to talk about his book "White Identity". I strongly encourage you guys to get involved.

[00:11:04] Moving along to the conference many of you are sick of hearing about the Conference. At this point you will be even sicker, if you can believe it, of hearing about the Conferencen by the time the conference comes around however it is imperative that we ensure as high a percentage of participation in the conference and attendance at the conference as possible. It's best to sign up earlier so we know exactly how many people to expect so there aren't any surprises. You know even if 300 people end up showing up.. if 90 percent of them sign up the week before... well that's not going to be great. I don't think it'll happen just like that but the sixth channel from the top is down from the top is Leading Our People Forward 2019. That is the name of our conference. You will see an invitation and there you will see a conference registration calendar. We'll go through all of this because many of you have heard me say it a thousand times already but just keep in mind a few important dates here on the 21st of this month registration is going to increase by twenty dollars. It's not increasing to twenty dollars, implying that it is less than twenty dollars to register for the conference. No. It's \$125 to register for the conference now and it will go up to \$145...if My math is correct.

[00:12:25] So in the spirit of saving money and getting signed up on time in having the agency to not procrastinate and o plan things ahead of time. I would like all of you who know that you're going to come to the conference to sign up tonight. Sign up during or after the fireside. It's pretty straightforward you can get it knocked out then you can start worrying about lodging, getting cheaper airfare, sorting out know maybe grabbing a seat in a nearby convoy or in a van that's going to be traveling through your area and the sooner you sign up the better your experience. Be the sooner you sign up the less money you will spend and the sooner set up the better accommodation and transportation you will be able to secure some place. [00:13:08] And with regard to the location you are not allowed to talk about the location beyond Appalachia. [4.7] If we see you doing that in the chat, we hear you doing that, if we hear that you've told anyone about that, you will be in trouble. You might be asked to .. you might have your conference registration refunded and be asked to not attend.

[00:13:29] We need people who can be careful, who can be sensitive to these things and to not be reckless and we do not want the location leaking. And that also means don't talk about the conference outside of IE. Don't tell people on your whatever Discord server...on your minecraft server. They'll tell people at your local YMCA just don't talk about the conference outside of these servers and if you're talking about it within the server...make sure you're not talking about where it. Don't ask don't ask don't tell when it comes to the precise location of the conference.

[00:14:00] If you'll see this..the next date on this registration calendar which is the 8th of February cancellation and refund deadline. If you sign up knowing that it's going to be in Appalachia and you basically realize and then you get the location, the precise location, you say oh is in a part of Appalachia that is further than I was willing to travel. I think that's a little weak. There are gonna be people traveling far further than you and if you do it early you will be able to afford it. And especially if you're driving it might just be an extra two to three hours on the road too bad. You know, suck it up.

[00:14:34] I'm going to I'm going to be driving for 10 hours to get there and I won't be the person who's driven the most. So it's worth pointing that out.

[00:14:41] But yeah basically that is that.

[00:14:45] And if if you find out it's too far away and you just can't go. We will fund you by the 8th but we're not refunding anyone after the eight just plan on cancelling by then if you need to.

[00:14:58] But guys this is going to be a spectacular event. It's going to be, uhh working on getting some great speakers. Participation should be far higher than it was last year. Last year it was great. 150 IE people together. Its a great time. Even the AirBnB where we had like 50 to 60... Louis' AirBnB... t's just it was great. It was one of the best weekeneds in my life. I had plenty of other people tell me that as well. Because the sense of solidarity that you have maybe AmRen or something is good right, you realize "Oh I could talk about these things here. People can understand a lot of memes, the same culture. Listen to this podcast. They've read the same articles right. ... All of those things". But what it's at IE there is, "'ve seen this person post on discord, oh this person knows you know my great friend, a really good friend of mine he was in my chapter but who move to his chapter" the sense of of community and fellowship and you will experience at this conference is something you're probably not going to get anywhere else. I've never felt anything like it. And I was I was riding I was still riding the high from the conference months and months afterwards. And of course the action on that on Sunday is going to be superb. Wayne's got some some great works, some great stuff in the works. So be sure that you can be sure that you sign up sooner than later.

[00:16:24] Guys please remember to keep your questions until the end. Make sure to tag me in them but I cannot keep up with the chat when I'm going through all of this.

[00:16:33] I will you know when it's time for questions.

[00:16:37] All right. Let's talk about activism in 2019. So we are an activist organization although we do focus on other things, we do have a big emphasis on community service, networking, interacting with the press when.. It appears that it will be to our advantage to do so. However activism is what we're about at the end of the day. And I think we need to alter the way we see activism the way that our chapters look at activism. Activism shouldn't be something that's a secondary concern. It shouldn't be. You know oh maybe we'll do a little activism next month. No, activism should be something that you do every time you get together. It might not always be feasible. But let me remind you there are actions you can do that require next to no planning. Putting up flyers requires next to no planning. Doing a park meetup, donating food or used clothes or whatever to a homeless shelter requires next to no planning. And I'm not trying to diminish the efforts of people who have who have planned these things but it just goes to show it's not like "oh we need to create a 200 foot banner and then get everyone together". No, something that you know with an hour or two of planning you can. You can, you know raise funds at the local level maybe approach some of the patrons and see if they'd be willing to fund that. And if you guys have projects you want funded you can come to me and we'll see if we can work something out. But we need to be thinking about activism and it comes back to the activism content that we put out. Its is activism is telos (Note: Greek for pilosphy), its what drives membership. It's what proves that we are serious about what we care about... about this organization and it's just what we do. It's what we do.

[00:18:28] And that's something that I've been reflecting on too at our local level. You know we've been getting together and we've to do a great community events and networking behind the scenes with Jared Taylor, with Roger Devlin, other people in the area having big get togethers and really just having a great behind the scenes community here , you know getting involved with people who write for conservative publications and stuff, there's a great network here in D.C. But the point is that I mean I've just been thinking about that we should be doing flyering every time we get together in addition to this. We should be doing a park cleanup every time we get together in addition to this because, look at it this way, when you're getting together with IE people, what content are you going to have to put on Twitter and other forms on other social media, just social media in general. What kind of content are you going to have that's going to send a message to people saying this is who we are...this Is where we are, in the case of particular chapter, and this is what we do. This is what we're about. Even if you're just broadcasting that guys are getting together, girls getting together to go out to you know some kind of Christmas market or you're getting together to do a speaking workshop right? An oration workshop then you are telling people this is what happens behind the scenes and that is content we can put on social media assuming everyone knows that their faces or the back of their heads are going to be featured there as well and that that's kind of a basic thing to keep in mind. But just keep that in mind every time you get together, what content is being created and if you're not creating any content you know, if your chapter is getting together once a week every month or once a week for months but has no content or even for a month has no content then your chapter is doing something wrong.

[00:20:12] And you know coordinators they've got lives. Often they have wives, they can be quite busy. So if you see that your chapter isn't putting out enough content stand up and by stand up I don't mean confront your coordinator. Go To your coordinator and say "Hey I've noticed we've not been putting out a lot of content. You're doing a great job. I would like to help out. I would like to ensure that every time we plan an event we're doing the park cleanup. We are doing flying. We're going out and talking to college students".

[00:20:38] I'll get into some of that stuff in a little later. But guys we're an activist organization I need to see more activism and we will be getting you a full activism list, not full but a very thorough activism list that gives you specific examples of types of actions you can go out and do. And that's something we should have had for you since day one. Since I took over, I'll take credit for that. I can't.. I'm not going to blame Nathan but you know in my defense I have recommended the book "Beautiful Trouble". This should be a must read rather it is a must read although I will, I will confess I haven't read the whole thing so I should get on that too. But I've read the part of you know basically the first half of the book that goes through... they call it "tactics", "trusted militant" but that's not what we're going for here. I mean I want to preface this before I post the book I want to say. This isn't...some of these things might not work for us. You can you can judge for yourself. Let's keep in mind that if you want to do an action the way to do that is to go to your coordinator work with them on something the coordinator will fill out a report and give it to the activism department and the activism department will work with the coordinator and I believe the main activists involved as well in sort something out. So under no circumstances are you to go off and do something on your own. And you know if it's if it doesn't turn out terribly we're still probably not going to post it but we might not kick you out.

[00:22:12] If It turns out you go off and do something weird and even if you say "oh I wasn't representing IE" everywhere you go you're representing IE. You know there's always the potential that you get out as an IE member and then that will be linked back. [12.2] So I'll give you one example, one guy won't say what region he was in. He's really upset by something that happened on a college campus recently. I mean the particular instance was absolutely infuriating. It's one of those things you read about in Breitbart, in the Daily Caller and you say man that's insane. Ad yeah I mean I totally understood where he's coming from but I get a message from someone saying "Hey so-and-so drove like seven hours to go to this college unannounced and he has a plan to go through like a one person demonstration". And I thought to myself "Why is he doing that? Why? First of all why didn't he go through the right procedure?" Right. I mean that's just kind of an irritant for that reason, right people aren't following the rules. Organizations have to know that we were built on rules that people don't follow certain protocols it's not going to work. I'm also just confused why would you want to do it alone. One person demonstration because if you get if you get 50 people on a street corner chanting something high energy smiling with a message that's a demonstration. If you get one person screaming on a street corner people are just gonna think you're crazy. Like they're going to think you're probably on meth. And the probably not going to listen to anything have to say. It's worth pointing out that this individual decided [00:23:47] he said "Don't worry I'm wearing a face mask. So no one's going to know who I am". I said oh face mask OK. You know they're definitely not going to think you're insane. He told me he had like bunny ears on too". [12.1]

[00:24:00] I thankfully nothing, no content was published. And I told him like look if you go do this like you're going to be really violating IE rules. But he was like, "look I already drove six hours up here. I need to do it". We'll talk about what that need says in a minute. But yeah he messaged me five minutes later and discord after is like "yeah I did it. And I look I guess I look pretty crazy I probably shouldn't have done it". And I was like ...yeah we are not, we're not wrong we've been, even though we've only been doing this for a few years we've been doing this for longer than the average person that's joined because most members in IE have been in for as long as I have. And you know that kind of this type of experience you can read about, you can read books like Beautiful Trouble which I'm about to post and get a pretty good overview of activism and you can learn quite a bit from the right, from giant... from the Left as well.

[00:24:54] But when it comes to doing Identitarian activism in America that's a very, very specific niche thing and a lot of the experience the know-how and and so forth is stuff that only we know only people in this organization really know it. So when people come into this they all want to do

things this way and do things that way. Well lo and behold well, our protocols are there for a reason. There's probably a precedent set for why you don't do this stuff but you don't what, I can tell you this without having any activism experience...I Think I would be able to tell you that standing on a street corner wearing a facemask and bunny ears screaming for five minutes and then walking away is not going to accomplish much of anything.

[00:25:36] But you know let's talk about when he said he really wanted to do it. What does that mean. Well that means that he is responding. He's not thinking strategically. He's thinking indulgent he feels an inner compulsion to go do a certain thing and I can understand I can sympathize with that. In that instance he was pissed about what happened. He was absolutely upset and he had the right to be so however we can't just operate emotionally. Right. Emotions certainly have their role. Of course you know it's good to be passionate about these issues but passions and emotions, both of those, must be tempered by reason and by strategy. And above all else we have to be strategic. We have to constantly be analyzing everything that we're doing thinking "is this going to work out to our advantage or is this going to make us look like idiots". Right.

[00:26:30] And I think the big one, of the big splits its you know its the optics debate. You got the guys they want to march around with armbands and the plastic [inaudible] whatever else. The skull masks, really spooky stuff right. They're doing that because they want, they're doing that because it makes them feel good. And we say "Hey it's not working. Hey that's not a good thing to do". They get offended because I think on some level they know, some level they're like yeah, this is just fun. It's fun to go out there and be a villain. So that's my take on that. But anyways let us talk about Beautiful Trouble.

[00:27:10] I'm going to post this book in #announcements. I don't think this is illegal since we're not hosting it and since it's on the Internet. It's actually one of the first results that comes up so I'm pretty sure these lefties don't care available for free. So this is this book. Here it is. Tactics which contains dozens of examples of activism. Is about 92 pages so we can all make it all read ninety pages and you can actually even if you don't want to read ninety two pages. Look at the different types and say. Thank. You look at the table of contents and say advanced leafleting and artistic vigil and banner hang. Awesome. I want to read about that. Well we've actually done that one probably more than all of the others on here so maybe you don't need to read that but there's no issue touching up on some of these things even if we're employing these tactics. I would recommend you read the theory as well. I've read some of it but it's not... haven't done that in quite some time and I do need to touch up on that so. Advanced Leafleting that's the first one they have here and it's very.. the weight of the information presented is very good. It's very structured, thats the word I'm looking for. Common uses, practitioners for their insight, so common uses of advanced leafleting to get people, to get important information into the right hands. Right. Sounds like something we're interested in. Practitioners center for tactical magic insight Institute for Applied autonomy.

[00:28:50] I dont know what that is. So this basically has some information on and it has the key principle at the it. So one key principle here is "Kill them with kindness pissing people off onto your cause any favors". Wow. Imagine that. So don't piss people off. Disarm with charm.

[00:29:11] Maybe your audience will let your guard down long enough to hear what you have to say. Wow. So you're telling me that going out there and wearing a skull mask and screaming racial epithets isn't the path to victory. I know it sounds like these leftists who have succeeded quite a bit. Sounds like they're optics cucks. What's up with that. I thought I thought antifa. They don't have to worry about optics so we don't. [23.7] But anyways you have plenty of others artistic vigil. It's pretty good. We've done a with these. We've done the we've quite done exactly what they're thinking of here but we did do the what was that the South Africa. The first part of South Africa demonstration which to date is our most popular tweet by far. They were that close to six thousand likes on that tweet and it was good stuff. So I'm going to go through all of these but I'll read off some of the

names here. I want all of you who are interested in doing activism which is probably most of you read through this get some ideas on your own. You don't need to wait for your coordinator to say hey we're going to go do this. No you can say hey I want to do this, here's a good action. Coordinators like to hear that as long as you're not stepping on their feet and you're not suggesting you know just really dumb ideas. And I'd like to believe that our coordinators are nice enough to not be mean to you if your ideas are misguided and naive. It's kind of our job to guide people in the right direction there.

[00:30:40] So some of these ideas that read them off eventually advanced leafleting, artistic vigil, banner hanging, blockade, creative disruption, creative petition, petition delivery, death strike, culture jamming...What is that? Page 28. Let's take a look. "Common uses of culture jamming altering the meaning of the target's messaging or brand, packaging critical messages is highly contagious. Media viruses.

[00:31:22] OK so for example for instance the Neo situationist (I have no idea what that means) magazine Adbusters has created American flags bearing corporate logos in place of stars. Yeah, I don't think they're complaining about corporations too often these days... The traditional flag which is often used to quash to set by equating America with liberty and progress was made to communicate its own critique. Corporations not the American people rule America. So yeah that's a cool form of activism that can be done. Now not going to read through all of these although I am actually really eager to kind of go through those. I'm excited to read through these and get some new ideas for activism to do at both the local and national level for 2019 but I think there's a good way to look at activism and that is activism is art. We should be creative with activism. We should make it interesting and engaging. Activism is like art because art at the end of the day is a way to manipulate form, color, language, music, sound, human expression to achieve a desired effect. And that is exactly what activism is as well. Right, when we drop a banner. Right? That is essentially a you know that's essentially a piece of artwork that we made. That is a craft that we need. That is a piece of canvas that has been painted and we are trying to influence.

[00:32:46] What is going on in people's heads when they see it, right? So there's ... no...we Should get creative with it. We absolutely should if you have artists in your chapter. Get them involved. Think about an art installation and you can that you can do it and you can leave at a college campus something that's going to grab people's attention something that's going to get people talking. But anyways there are many ideas and we're going to be demanding more diversity from activism. We're going to be demanding more activism and more diversity so 2018 was spectacular. Our activism department flourished, it exploded. We did our best actions yet. Almost seems like almost every action was our best action yet at the time when that is largely due to to Wayne and Louis for doing such a great job in the activism department. But yeah now that it's 2019 we want to increase the amount of activism that we're doing and we want to diversify the activism as well. So guys read this book at the very least go through the examples and think about what you can implement in your chapter. Have fun with it. This is supposed to be fun, its supposed to be engaging and it's supposed to be meaningful and it is. You'll have doing some awesome action like this is going to grab people's attention is going to give you far more fulfillment and meaning than playing video games, than sitting at home staring at the wall, looking at Facebook right. So we need to be more engaged. Now one form of activism to see more of is going to college campuses. I would like to see you guys going to college campuses and talking to students. Now does that mean that you go up and you start yelling about white identity? No. We can do that if you wanted but I think...let's Be honest I think a lot of people are hesitant about to go to college campuses and talk to students but we need to get over that. We need to get over that. Now for the people who just can't do activism that's fine. No one's going to be forced to do this but there are a lot of people that are willing to put themselves out there but just be aware of your surroundings.

[00:34:42] If you're going on the UC Berkeley campus, they'll do it at night and be you know just keep in mind who you're talking to and so forth. I would almost say if you're at one of these extremely left wing campuses just be extra cautious when you do it. In my experience I did quite a bit of this at SDSU which is my alma mater. If you're targeting like fit looking white guys they're going to be at the very least be somewhat receptive like they get it.

[00:35:12] They get what's going on. They all you know quite often they do a lot of the talking they're like "Yeah what's up with that. You know bashing white people all the time" because again these guys ... go to ... you talk to it's like the people who...

[00:35:25] And one case like I was talking to one guy he was already there but he never heard of the alt-right or anything as we were calling it back then but he was like... I'd like cut the conversation short because he was like ... he kept wanting to go on and on about this stuff. And I was like "that's great". But ... print out a sheet that has an email list and be like "hey why don't you give me an e-mail" and phone number would be good to that. This is very important because...painting stuff and talking to people that you know and it's alright it raises consciousness I suppose. But we want to get these people involved.

[00:35:53] We wanna get them active, we want to invite them out to the event and print out a list of ... print out a blank e-mail list get people to sign up. Well we did this at AmRen which by the way was a really great event and I hope to see you all Amren this year some of the best people that we brought on last year, we brought on from AmRen. Gimlet who's our new CTO to great work and he's also our Utah coordinator too. Meet him at AmRen and had a conversation with him, you know I just struck up a conversation with him in the hallway. Now he's one of our best guys. We need to get out there. We absolutely do need to get out there and it's really great to get pictures of us talking to college students. You know we need to show that we're out there. We're totally confident in our ability to express our ideas and we're not afraid of the taboo. We're not afraid of leftwing violence. We are going to continue speaking online, exercising our First Amendment rights and there's nothing they can do to stop us right? So I would like to see you guys go out there and talk to college students. I would like you to move, do it for the first time with your coordinator. If you don't have a coordinator in your area and you'd like to do that. please get in touch with me because you'll realize that there are.. its going to be a learning experience right? In my experience it's best to have have a really good, it's kind of like a sales pitch right? I did some canvassing right, I did some canvassing door to door for an environmentalist company nonprofit when I was in college it was kind of a weird job and I only did it for three months. But you start off with the pitch right when they open the door you know exactly where you're going to say and you know when you start the conversation along by you know starting with a pre-package pitch or introduction you know where it's going to go. You might not know 100 percent but you know that it's going to go in your direction. Then you're going to be able to like the more you do with the same pitch the more you kind of realize that people are going to respond. You know it's like a video game right there like five dialogue options right? You people are going to respond in a certain, you know. You say "Hey how do you feel about America building a wall along the southern border"? How many possible options are there. There's it's going to be like indifference. Yes. No. And then there will be different explanations for why but you can kind of start to piece things together in your heads so that you're prepared. But yeah when you're going out to talk to college students think about what some good introductions might be. Some good pitches might be one really good one is "hey how would you feel if there was a organization on campus for people of European heritage. And generally in my experience there are like "Sure why not".

[00:38:41] You know even that even like just the apolitical white bro types they even if they're not pro white they're at the very least they they've been conditioned to see that as an issue when you start talking about how like you know it's these little liberals and so forth they act like you're some

kind of lunatic or extremist just for being part of a group like that and you know they have all the other groups like that for other races on campus they'll be like "Oh yeah wow. And we thought about it that way".

[00:39:03] So do this. Hand out materials put up flyers as you're doing it. Get signatures. I want to see people doing this. In fact the first person who goes out and does it I will mail you five copies of "Ethno politics" and five copies of "Race and the American Prospect" to your chapter. And that is the first chapter to do it and post the pictures and the activism...and activism photos. And anyone else who does it this month will receive one free book of each for you or someone else in your chapter.

[00:39:42] So yeah would like you guys to get out there and get involved. And here's another idea I'd like to know the spirit of being more active in growing this organization. Here's another idea. [00:39:57] So we talked about this in the past but creating front groups is a good way to get involved...to bring people of like minds to you. [7.8] Now are we we already doing that in IE? Yes but it is still somewhat dangerous to go out and say. You know if you guys are worried about getting doxxed which many of you should be. It can be dangerous to, I mean I guess you know what I'm getting at here. It can be somewhat of a seen as somewhat of a risk to go walking around saying I'm with IE and some of you might not be confident. It's OK. I would encourage you guys to do that in the right situations that I just did with the college outreach thing but it can be useful to have front groups. [00:40:38] Say you live in San Diego create a San Diego MAGA group and you create a Discord server, you can create a Facebook page you can get people involved and chapters there are IE chapters doing this. I'd like to see more of them do it. And they have facilitated recruitment to Identity Evropa through these front groups. Now when you have a front group like that that allows you to attract people of like mind while at the same time while drawing less ire from the SPLC. [25.9] Right. And that you know there are pros and cons to be very explicit and there are some pros and cons to being implicit right. The pros and cons of being explicit is you're going to be spreading the right message and unadulterated message. That's what we do. There's also pros and cons between or rather.. you know some of the other benefits of doing that is do you know that you're anyone who is attracted to Identity Evropa...they aren't going to mistake us for being like a Bill Mitchell-esq Trumpian group. We shouldn't be hostile to them, to other Trump supporters. But yeah it's all about what we are about and we want to attract people who get what issues, which issues we care about. [00:41:53] What they cons to being very explicit are that you end up, I mean obviously painting a huge target on yourself. That's obviously what you see with us. But you know somebody has to do it. [11.7] That's the risk we're willing to take. But with front groups the pro is you're still allowed to track people. You'll have less of a target on you so your doxx risk is smaller but the purpose shouldn't be just to get a MAGA group, it should be to bring people in and to get people involved into stuff like this.

[00:42:27] So I'd like to see you guys do that all of you can do that, all of you can do that in your local chapters. Maybe that can be your niche. If you're looking for a niche in local chapter of the agency, if not the kind of guy who's just going to sit back and wait for someone else to do, yeah create a local MAGA group do something along those lines.

[00:42:47] And you can even create a social media pages, create flyers hand them out to people Trump rallies things of that sort. So I strongly encourage you guys that. I would like to remind you of a few more things before we go into the Q and A. [00:43:07] First of all please remember to pay your dues on time. It is a colossal headache trying to get people to pay their dues. [5.6] The best thing you can do is...well the best thing you can do is pay yearly. You save money and you only have to be reminded once if at all. The second best thing is to pay biyearly. Pay every six months and that will ensure that you do save money and you know you only have to get reminded twice a year tops paying once a month. And we have to remind you every month and you're just constantly

falling behind. It's just of, it's kind of pleb here for lack of a better term. So please don't be the guy that needs to be reminded to pay your \$10 a month. The best you know it's going to take a month then just set on a sort of set a reminder on your phone and then you can. Basically go from there and know that you're good to go every month. I sometimes forget. I haven't had to be reminded. But you know it is very, it's very easy to forget these things and also for the younger members as you get older you're not writing things down if you're not setting reminders in your phone you should count on forgetting. That's kind of where I am. If I forget to put something down on my phone then there's a very good chance I'm going to forget it because, [00:44:41] I like to believe, it's not because I'm stupid [1.8] but it's generally just because there's so much else going on, so many other things to keep track of it. Your memory might get a little worse but I think most people's commitments tend to multiply as they age. That's good thing clearly if you have family and so forth. If you have nothing going on in your life then that's not a good thing. So decided you know the fact that there are a couple of things going on in life generally is a good thing.

[00:45:12] What else do I have here. Well just to wrap up I would like to remind you guys sorting things over, diversify your activism. Try to make your chapter easier. Trying to. This is something that I don't know if I've mentioned this before but I think I will. Be recognizing people and chapters for their contributions. You know I'm not going to say what the categories are maybe things like a member of the year, chapter of the year things that can be done. So 2018 it's over. But 2019 is the year to make your chapter the best. I like good natured, emphasis on good natured, good nation competition between different chapters.

[00:47:33] So keep that in mind also if you leave and you're making you make up reasons.

[00:47:38] You know I will know and again am I going to do anything. No of course not. But I had one guy leave one guy left six months ago and he was a good member he didn't really go to that many meet ups but he helped out with other things and he kept giving me reasons for why he was leaving and I was like I kept pointing out where they were bad reasons. Eventually he was like [00:47:58] "Yeah I'm just really worried about getting doxxed" [1.3] and I was like "OK there it is". Like to your remind you guys. I'm not going to say our roster isn't safe. It's pretty safe. Anyone who touches it has been forced to sign an NDA into the number of people who have access to the whole thing is is very small.

[00:48:18] But you know if I were you and I had a lot to lose and I didn't want to get doxxed [00:48:22] which you probably should but, all of this should apply to you. I would be I would be on the roster under an alias. I wouldn't be using my real name or my face on this Discord, Slack or anything else definitely not on Twitter and I would dues in cash. Now we go to great lengths to maintain your security but if you are not doing all of those things and you're worried about your OPSEC you're like "Oh man I might need to like leave this discord server before someone finds out I'm on this discord". It's silly. It's really silly. So if you ever want to get change your information changed on Apollo please let me know and I'll be glad to do it. [36.5]

[00:48:59] Go to the members website which is members.identityevropa.com.

[00:49:09] That also applies to your email as well. If you're if you have you under the roster as John Smith but your real name is listed on the email well something that you might keep in mind.

[00:49:18] But yeah so that's that's basically that I just want to keep you guys from remind you [00:49:24] guys that... and I'll wrap up on this note but after Charlottesville we saw mass doxxing, it was terrible people, lost their livelihoods...many people bounce back and I think it's kind of damage done was a little over exaggerated in some cases though certainly not in all. We've demonstrated that we can go out there and do activism without getting doxxed, without ruining your life and all it took was leadership and I'm not just saying me, leadership in the broader dissident right wanting people to be safe, wanting people to...thinking how can we do activism but also maintain how we do high levels of activism, show our face. Get out there not wear masks not wear bandanas while at the same time ensuring that our members as few ... get doxxed as possible.

[00:50:16] As a result it was like maybe 5 if not less people who got doxxed during 2018 and [59.7] any person getting doxxed is tragic. I'm not really interested in victim blaming. I think we can definitely learn from what people have done wrong without it being you know again a blaming thing but which to keep in mind look what you do on the Internet is is probably what's going to get you doxxed unless you commit a crime because if you commit a crime even if it's just vandalism even if you use frankly which we tell you not to use you put that up somewhere. Yeah. Then you know if you get a vandalism charge it'll be public knowledge and they'll write an article about it. Don't post anything on social media under your real name under your face that is dissident.

[00:51:01] By that I mean anything above something. You know the most lukewarm of conservatives would post. And but look if you if you're self-employed I did a whole thread on this. If you're self-employed, employed in the movement, you won the lottery. Sure. Yeah. Say it in your real face, your real name. That's it's definitely a good thing.

[00:51:24] I had people calling me out for that thread saying you know like Matt Parrot right saying we shouldn't be encouraging people to hide in the corner. What are you talking about? I basically said if you can do it you should do it. If you can't do it, you shouldn't. But you know, notice, pay attention it's very interesting how some of the same people that are trying to get you out in the streets fighting antifa are the same ones that seem to take issue with people telling you to be careful about how you handle yourself on the Internet. It's almost like if these people want you to be out there getting bashed in the face by antifa it's almost as if they want you to get dox so you know you'll you'll be an undesirable just like them for the rest of your life. And yeah. Look guys we broke free from some very, very toxic and frankly disturbed individuals people who are actually just bad people something that transcends politics. And I'm not trying to self aggrandize here I'm not saying you should be you should be thanking me or anything like that. But I want you guys to know there's things that have happened behind the scenes that would boggle your mind with regard to the depravity and the complete lack of any ethical decency for people within the movement. I'm not talking about people saying let's do bad things antifa. Know that's you know we do want to do anything illegal but doxxing of people in the movement, threatening them, blackmailing people with their doxx by saying hey do this for me or I'm going to doxx you. I mean people that tried to get away from certain segments of the movement. It was like them leaving a cult. And for certain segments of the movement it actually is a cult. It totally is. So just keep in mind. When I when I took over and I said we're just going to be doing our own thing. I had a lot of well-intentioned people ask me why aren't we doing stuff with this group. Why aren't we doing stuff with TWP? We should have bigger .. we should do... No, no, noone is asking me that at this point. Literally no one is. And I've seen how people in the broader alt-right community the smarter ones, they're not even saying that anymore. So not only are people outside of IE basically being forced to admit that we whree right but people outside as well who doing the same.

"Leaders Lead Last" by Simon Sinek / Signage. It's a really good one. "Adios America" if you haven't read it. And what's another How to Win Friends and Influence People is really good. So many of the mistakes I see people make in interpersonal interactions both within and without the organization. Even to seen people destroy relationships in general it's it's you know these things could be remedied by reading Dale Carnegie's book and it's perhaps a bit cheesy and it's been a bit...I mean it's one it's just kind of cliché I think just because of how hegemonic it's become how it's basically Dale Carnegie was a household name for a long time but yeah that book is very important. Some people get it intuitively but it's something that everyone should read at least once. If you're looking for something unrelated to leadership I am very close to finishing "The Passion of

the Western Mind" by Richard Tana. It's not an easy read. It's not the hardest read, simply not as incoherent as Nietzsche can be at times particularly early Nietzsche but the Passion of the Western Mind is great because I think most people don't want to read philosophy. I'm kind of in between like I can appreciate some of it but it's not really easy for me. I like reading Nietzsche but it's not easy by any means. Maybe it's easy to other people but "The Passion of the Western Mind" is good because it gives you a relatively concise overview of Western intellectual history starting from ancient Greece. Moving up to postmodernism and I think most people who are somewhat educated will probably be familiar with some of the ideas there. But having it all together in one place is really good because he talks about how it's not just important to understand what Plato thought and then understand what Cicero.

So these kinds of things matter to you.
