American Identity Movement (Identity Evropa) Weekly Address by president Patrick Casey May 22, 2019

[00:00:00] Good evening everyone, hope you're doing well. I'm your president Patrick Casey and welcome to this week's Weekly Address. So to begin I just need one person to message me to let me know that they can hear me. You know, a few weeks ago I thought my mic was on and we got 15 minutes into the weekly address and I was told that no one could hear me. So spirit of... does not make me have to, OK, good, good, confirmation, I'm being messaged across many different platforms and devices. So that's good to hear.

[00:00:40] Well our white pill of the week is AmRen. It was a successful conference. My speech seemed to be pretty well received. We had our fellow AlMer James Allsup give a fantastic speech as well. And despite the the best efforts of the opposition, of antifa, the conference went very well, right. You give them an A for effort, but they, they weren't able to do much more than catch a few criminal charges. They didn't stop much of anything, so that is good. We're gonna do an AmRen roundup towards the end, not towards the end, maybe towards the middle. But for now that that will have to suffice. But we will do our activism roundup now.

[00:01:26] I don't, I know we had stuff happen in the past week, I don't think that we have posted it yet. I know you guys have been, a number of you have been pretty good about getting out there. Obviously lots of flyering happening, so make sure to keep that out, make sure you're doing it legally, make sure you're not, stick to public, public bulletin boards, don't tape anything, I'd be very careful with the stickers, you know, make sure you, you check with a local attorney to be sure that you can, you can get, you know, you can put flyers up and stickers up in certain ways.

[00:01:59] So, opening up our Twitter page here, all right here we are. So the run up to the last week, we had our videos from the Stand Against Racism Rally get posted. Props to our video team for, you know, another fantastic video. I guess there are two videos but really it was one that we chopped up.

[00:02:34] The Stand Against Racism Rally was, at first we got there and it seemed pretty lame and they just had back to back speakers so we didn't have much of a chance to get too close and ask questions without, you know, we figured if we went up there and we just started interrupting the speeches to ask questions, people would have gotten pretty pissed off and not talk to us. So we ended up staying, we were on the side streets, so we're on the sidewalk about, I don't know, 20 feet away from where the main event was taking place, we were able to get people when they were coming and going. And you saw basically all of the interactions that we had, with the liberal boomer in particular being the most interesting. And as I discussed I think...I don't think I mentioned this on Twitter. So unfortunately the cameras stopped rolling after the interview and as, you know, those of you watched the video will remember that the guy's wife, who is standing off camera, urged him to leave and he started swearing at us and then they left. Well, as he was leaving, you know, I told him to have a nice day and whatever else and some of our guys were kind of, you know, bantzing him a bit and nothing, nothing too offensive, and he ended up flipping us off and saying we need, we need a new civil war. So that's what's on these minds, you know, the minds of these deranged liberal boomers, right, not, not all boomers, we like our boomers, but yeah these people are absolutely nuts. They consume nothing but Rachel Maddow and whatever else all day and, you know, to be convinced of, to be convinced that there's no, there aren't leftists around anymore, is about the most

delusional thing you can, you can believe, right. I mean you just look at the people protesting any right wing event, be it a Trump rally or something else. Right. In many cases they're flying communist flags and that, there are a fair amount of them. Right. I think there are more of us overall. But you know given that their views are acceptable or even perhaps beneficial within the neo liberal soft tyranny that we find ourselves, they don't really have to worry about, it is not as much of a social cost. They wear masks because they go out to commit acts of violence and crimes and they don't want to be identified.

[00:04:58] So yeah, looks like we had photos from a park clean up that took place a few weeks ago in D.C.

[00:05:07] A lot of flyering and that was about it.

[00:05:10] So a fairly quiet week in terms of activism. We had close to 40 people from the organization at AmRen. I don't think we did a final count but my estimate is that it would be somewhere around there. So let's talk about AmRen. AmRen was a massive success. Henry Wolff and Jared Taylor deserve quite a bit of credit for throwing yet another successful event despite the, you know, despite the odds, despite everything, all of the forces in society trying to ensure that people with our views cannot get together, it was, yeah, it was, it was a resounding success. So it was, it was for our organization a big success in particular right. Having two speakers up there was huge, I think that was the first time that's ever happened for our organization. We also had an iPad with us and we were using that to sign people up on the spot. I think we got at least a dozen people to sign up. We received, we sold a lot of merch, a lot of books, again, this stuff goes to the organization. It's not, not lining my pockets with the money. We even had a fellow come up and give me basically a thousand dollars in cash which was pretty cool. Which again, he didn't, I didn't get a chance to talk to him, the guy walked up put it in my hands, I said thank you, and then he just walked away, and, I know I was meaning to try to find him but I didn't get a chance to bump into him. I'm assuming he wanted that money to go to the organization. So I did not take that as a personal donation. But overall was it was a good weekend. It was, it was a good chance to network. I met a lot of great people, we had a good chance to spread our message, and I'm sure there will be many people who will apply because they met us, even if they did not do it on the spot. Moreover we got quite a few emails from people who have interesting things going on all over the world really not just all over the country.

[00:07:02] So one of the main, you know, obviously going to enjoy the speeches and to learn quite a bit about the various subjects discussed, is, that's a main draw certainly, but the networking is really the best part of these events. So I would highly encourage everyone to attend the next conference which will be probably somewhere around the same time next year, although there, I'm sure there'll be some variation in terms of the date, but you should probably start thinking about that if you want to attend. I'm not sure when it will be announced but, you know, just kind of have that on your, on, on, basically, on the horizon. I want to see if we can get at least 50 people there, right, so that's going to be more than we had, that would be more than we had this year or any other year, but, I mean, any, any large gathering of well adjusted people who share our view,s we want to be there, right, assuming that we're invited. We don't want, we're not going to try to, you know, burst in uninvited to some private conference somewhere, but yeah, we should, we should absolutely be at these things, we should be networking with people who already share our views, are very close to our views, in order to spread awareness of who we are and what we're about, encourage people to join, but also to let people know why it's

important to do activism, right. There are a lot of people who might think oh, why do banner drops, why do this, why do that. Well, we want to, I mean, we have to justify what we're doing, right, there is a big risk that, that is entailed from doing activism. It's important for people to understand not only why they should consider doing activism, but why they should as well support people who are out there risking their safety, risking getting doxed, and all kinds of other things, while doing activism.

[00:08:56] So let's talk about, I wanna remind you guys of what our activism policy is. So I think most of you are probably aware but, never hurts to hammer this point home. We have a very official process for which activism that, that must be followed in order for activism to occur. What that means is that you have to fill out an activism proposal, right, an activism proposal doesn't consist of DMing me saying, hey, can I do this action. What that means is you need to go to your chapter leader, and you guys can work on an activism proposal, right. We have a form that you fill out. It's very formal. The form isn't, it's just one or two pages, I believe. You fill out the form, and then you have your chapter leader, not you, your chapter leader, turn it in to the activism department, and the activism department will take a look, will determine whether or not it's up to speed, right, it's gonna work with you, change the messaging, change some things. And then once you get it officially approved, then you're good to go, but it's absolutely vital to the success of our organization that everyone is on the same page about whether or not an action can be used, our, cause the issue was before we implemented these policies, people were just kind of on their own, they go out, they do an action, turn it in, and you know, oftentimes what would happen before is it wouldn't be what we were looking for, and we are never going to post a mediocre action on social media simply because people put their time energy and money into it. That might sound a bit draconian and harsh but it's, we can't, we have to keep high standards for everything that we do. But now we've had this in place since the beginning of AIM with the activism proposal process. You will never have to worry about that as long as you follow it. So if you, you know, if the muse strikes and you want to go out and do some action on your own, well, you shouldn't do that. Also that applies to non-IE, or, sorry, non-AIM activism. We cannot have you guys going out and, you know, if you want to,, say you know, if you come to me and say, hey I want to go wear some goofy costume and stand on the street corner, the street corner screaming, but saying, oh but it won't be AIM, that's, chances are we're not going to be OK with you doing that. There are some instances in which it is ok for you as a member of this organization to do non-AIM activism, but it's a highly contextual thing, and a lot of it depends on what you have going on, not what you have going on, you know, are you doing it with a different group, what's the tone, what's the messaging, right, because as a member of this organization, technically everything you do reflects on us. So that's something to keep in mind. And we, just, you know, we can't have you, like, let's say you go do something really goofy or embarrassing. Well, if it gets back, you know, people find out that you are a member of AIM, then it could make us look bad. So just keep that in mind. I'm not totally ruling out non-AIM activism. [00:12:07] You can't do activism with other dissident right groups. You can do it with your college Republicans or some other, you know, perhaps non-partisan group, right, if you want to go participate in some protest against high taxes with your local Libertarian or your local Tea Party group. [17.8s] Well, you know, maybe there's, there are better uses of your time, but, you know, that would be an example of something that's OK. But given that it's very highly subjective and contextual. Go to your chapter leader, you can come to me as well, and we'll let you know.

[00:12:42] So we have a number of events coming up. [00:12:44] The fourth of July weekend in D.C. we are going to be doing something, not a hundred percent sure, we're starting to get to work on that now. But I would, I would like to encourage you guys to

come out. You can stay at the HQ free of charge. [14.2s] Granted you might have to endure some relatively Spartan-like accommodations, though I had people out here for the Politics and Prose action, I don't think it was too Spartan-like, right, people at the very least had air mattresses and and so forth. So, but, we will have more information on that announced on MatterMost probably sometime next week. But it's definitely good for you put that on your calendar and try to make it out.

[00:13:31] [00:13:31] We are also going to be doing a national action in Texas in August. [6.7s] I will post on MatterMost the exact dates and information there, and we're going to start, you know, that's, that's going to be a big one, that's going to be one you don't want to miss. We're gonna have a lot of people there. It's gonna be a great time. There's plenty of time for you to take off work, for you to save up money, for you to, you know, try to do some crowd funding at the local level to see if people can, you know, get, if you can get out there. I'd like to see at least one person from every chapter out at the event in Texas, that's definitely going to be the biggest action of the summer. So again, be on the lookout on MatterMost.

[00:14:13] For more information, there, additionally, [00:14:18] there is going to be a North Atlantic retreat at some point during the summer. [4.2s] If you're on the North Atlantic MatterMost team you will have seen a post for that. So get in touch with the fellow who posted it and we'll get you set up there. That's gonna be a good time, I'm hoping to make it out there, and again, yeah, there will be more information on MatterMost.

[00:14:44] So I can give you a few updates on the lawsuit as well. Because I know that though AIM is not involved in the lawsuit, though Identity Evropa is, it is something that we are, technically it's still relevant to not only our future as an organization, but to the broader dissident right as well.

[00:15:03] So I think we're nearing the end of discovery and there's no evidence that anyone who was in Identity Evropa, or the organization Identity Evropa itself, ever was engaged in the type of activity that the other side is alleging, namely that Identity Evropa, the claim that Identity Evropa went to Charlottesville to commit acts of racially motivated violence with the goal of denying the civil liberties of the other side. If anything, the opposite was the case, right. If anything, the opposite was the case. People who were antiwhite, even if they themselves were white, right, self-hating white people, and many nonwhites who have a racial animus against white people, used violence to effectively create a state of anarchy that the establishment used as a pretext to shut down the rally, right, we had a permit for the rally, though I was not an organizer, I did attend, not really in any official capacity for IE, I just kind of went on my own with some people I knew, and we peacefully entered, peacefully exited. Many people on the right weren't so lucky. They were subjected to various attacks just trying to get into the park, trying to peacefully enter the park. So not only is this lawsuit vital for the success of the dissident right, but, I mean, it's, it's just, it's going to play a large role in how all of this is remembered, because this lawsuit is how the establishment overall decided to attack the rally-goers, right. People who actually committed crimes there, or were accused of committing crimes, were granted, there were criminal charges set upon them, right, made against them. But I think it's almost a concession that, you know, most people who attended, the overwhelming majority as far as I can tell, didn't do anything illegal, right. That's why they weren't, these people didn't get arrested for things. So, I mean, they're claiming that we did. But there's, there's no evidence of it, so far.

[00:17:15] So basically with this lawsuit the discovery phase is coming to an end. And so what that means is we're going to be coming up on a point where Identity Evropa as a corporation that, you know, is no longer basically in operation, though it exists on paper, will be, have the opportunity to have a judgment granted for or against us. By us, I mean me, because I am the only member of Identity Evropa at this point, so I'm not named personally in this lawsuit, which is, which I'm very thankful for. But at the same time, it's, you know, that there's quite a lot riding on it nonetheless. Well, there is a good, there is a chance that Identity Evropa could get off, right, and that would be very good.

[00:18:04] There's also the chance that the judge says, well, Identity Evropa is guilty of these things, and they need to pay out a million dollars, whatever, I think that the greatest chance is that it will continue to trial. So this could well extend into 2020, and then, I mean. that's a big part of their strategy. They're trying to bleed the dissident right dry. They know that legal expenses can be very expensive and believe me they are. And as a result they want to, like I said, they want to bleed the dissident right dry. So I, I'm overly, I'm overall optimistic. Charlottesville is somewhat of an anomaly, legally, but at the same time, you know they're looking for evidence in chat logs and whatever else of, you know, some people saying that they went to Charlottesville to commit acts of racial violence. I can't speak for other groups, but I would say that I would be surprised if anyone, if any evidence exists on the right of anyone saying that, right. Not obviously didn't happen within Identity Evropa, I'd be surprised if that happened to anyone. So we're going to have to wait to see how these things play out. It will be interesting to say the least. This is obviously a lawsuit that has national, if not international, attention, so definitely very important stuff. But just to clarify, we have not turned over information that will be, lead to people getting doxed, right, nor will we. I think that the discovery is basically coming to an end, and it just didn't happen. People do have a constitutional right to anonymously practice, you know, engage in polite political activity, right. That's something that has existed since the beginning of America. Right. Many founding fathers wrote under aliases. So now to the extent that that will hold up overall, we'll see. But overall it's very, very, very unlikely that anyone on our side will get doxed released anyone from Identity Evropa will get doxed as a result of discovery. I mean, I, believe me, I've taken great lengths to ensure that that's how that, you know, that we ,that we push back on any attempts to gain that kind of personal information.

[00:20:32] So let's talk about the payment processor. Well, we were kicked off of Cash App, fun while it lasted. We probably made one hundred dollars as an organization just for signing people up. So thank you Cash App for the free money. Also a number of you got five free dollars. You're welcome. But we do have two payment options we have the P.O. box which you can find on our web site. I believe it's on MatterMost as well under Resources. We do have another payment processor that is available under Resources as well. But beyond that we are working on a more long term solution and I actually took, we finally finished our application process for that today. So I'm looking forward to seeing that develop. I think this is going to be a pretty good way of doing things. We'll have to see. Nothing's perfect. But fortunately you know with the P.O. box we can always facilitate these kinds of economic transactions to keep the organization going. Speaking of keeping the organization going, thank you to our patron liaison who's doing a fantastic job of helping that program grow. I would like to encourage all patrons who are behind on their patron dues to get, you know, get back to it. Unlike regular dues, you know, we're not going to demand that you pay back dues for your patronage, though that would certainly be welcomed. This organization is doing OK financially. We need to be doing better though we're not bankrupt. But we do need to kind of step it up, and I'm going to be doing quite a bit to fundraise, reaching out to individuals just to try to solicit larger donations. We're

working on building a mailing list that we can use to fundraise because you know many on the dissident right who have been doing this for a while and who have enough money to pay for, you know, pay their staff well, and so forth, keep the lights on, all the important stuff. And also conservatism inc., and most nonprofits in general, do really well with mailing lists. So that is a big thing that we're going to be working on in the future. And again, you know, the post office is, the postal system is something that we can't get kicked off of. Right. I mean at least not, there would have to be drastic changes to society in order for that to happen. But I would like to encourage you guys if you have an extra \$50, \$150, \$300 plus per month. Please consider becoming a patron, it is, I mean if you're, especially if you can't do activism, I would just strongly ask you to, I mean even if you're not giving that to us, and I would hope that you would, give it to someone, give it to AmRen, give it to VDARE, right, the organization, you know, the dissident right, can only function if the people who are above ground, who are operating openly, taking risks, have, have substantial support financially or otherwise from people who are, you know, having families, working jobs, not doing activism and so forth. So you know, the fifty dollars a month is something I think most people can do. We have patrons who are working service industry jobs while they're in college, they're giving an extra \$50 per month. Right. This organization, this is not going to give me pay raises, I don't make much money at all and I'm fine with where I am right now, because we have bigger goals for the organization. And in fact I would like to be able to hire more people, right, to get more people and allow them to become resilient, right, to have jobs that make them have to worry less about doxing, to allow them to do something that's more fulfilling than what they're doing. And just, you know, though every time we pay for a new staff member in this organization we just get so much more out of, we're just, it's so much, so much more successful. So again, if you are interested in becoming a patron, and I would please ask you to consider doing so if you have the extra \$50 per month, please get in touch with Carl on the server and he will help you get set up.

[00:24:43] So I'm excited to announce that we are going to be doing a weekly OPSEC seminar similar to how we do these, right, probably on Discord, if not another platform, in which we will go over every week the basics and some advanced OPSEC tips. Right. Looking back on the doxes that happens at the tail end of IE, most of those boxes were low hanging fruit, right. People offering up their personal information that you know on, on LinkedIn, on Google, something, you know, maybe not Google, but LinkedIn, Facebook in particular, Twitter maybe, and all of that stuff is very easily preventable and that's good news. Now I'm not blaming those people. In fact I am somewhat blaming myself, because we, it is our job in leadership to never assume that you guys know the right way to do things. A lot of you guys already do. I'm not trying to insult your intelligence. Point is, is that someone joins this organization, they need to be fully aware of the potential consequences and how you can go about doing that.

[00:25:51] Now, there are a number of people who got, in fact I think the overwhelming majority of people who got doxed as a result of the IE leaks, are doing well now. I think there are only a few that I can think of that are still looking for a job but it hasn't really been that long. In some other cases it's just been a month or two. Now obviously they don't want to go through that. Thanks to the dox fundraiser that we've been able to do, we've been able to give out thousands of dollars to people, and that's great, because we want to help our people when they put themselves on the line and pay the price. But the point is with doxing, guys, is that, you know, can be very trying. I think more often than not the stress, the most damage done oftentimes, or the thing that makes it the worse for people, is the fear, it's the anxiety of going through all of that. A lot of people went through all of that only to not have nothing happen, right, there were people who were freaking out, my life is

over, everything's done, I'm going to have to leave the country. Well a lot of those people, nothing happened to them, but in some cases some people's employers were OK with it. They said, sure your practiceing, you're nonviolently practicing your constitutional right to political activity, political expression. That's good. In some cases people did get fired. It's unfortunate, but most of those people bounced back, and some of them, I know of at least a few cases where people are making more money now in their new jobs. And those people understand that if you don't put that personal information out there on the Internet, under a LinkedIn, under a Facebook, no one's going to find it. It's really hard, it's pretty hard to find out where someone works unless you, I mean and antifa's not at the point where they're hiring like PIs to go after people. I mean, it's, maybe it's been done before, I don't know. The only time I've heard of that happening to someone on the right is when they commit a crime, like if they, in one instance I heard of someone who flyered, like, a high school not anyone in our organization. And yeah, I mean that's, that's illegal, you can't, you can't do that, and so they hired a PI and they tracked him down. So, but again, the P.I., what they work with a lot of times, is just information that people volunteered about themselves on the Internet. So I would like to strongly impress upon you a few basic points. We're going to go over these more in depth at our weekly OPSEC seminars. But just use different nicknames across different platforms. I would include MatterMost, I would not use the same thing on MatterMost that you use somewhere, on Twitter, somewhere else, right. Because that's going to be able to link things, that's going to be more breadcrumbs. I would not use your first name, your real first hame, as an alias. Believe it or not, you know, you're giving the other side information there when you didn't have to, again, getting your employer info off the Internet if you can is vital. I would say just deleting normie social media in general is good. Well you want people to be able to Google your name and not have anything come up. Now there are services like Delete Me that can be used to delete a lot of your personal info, like, right, your home address, cell phone, e-mail, stuff like that. I've heard that Delete Me works. You can also petition I believe to websites like BeenVerified and MyLife to have your stuff removed and that's good to do too, so. Guys, I know people have been doing this for decades, decades, and they've been able to build up great careers, families, without having, you know, while being able to enjoy their constitutional right to peacefully nonviolently participate in anonymous political activity. So just keep that in mind, it is doable. But, you know, life goes on after doxing, it does, no one ends up starving in a ditch. But you also want to make sure that if you do get doxed, you have a clean dox. This is why it's important not to get carried away with the shitposting not to say indefensible things in jest, or seriously, right. We are well-adjusted patriotic Americans of European descent, we are standing up against blatant injustices that we are being subjected to by a corrupt ruling class. We are absolutely, absolutely have the moral high ground. But you know, if in your dox you're just, you know, saying all sorts of obscure outlandish things. Well you quickly lose moral high ground there. So just keep that in mind.

[00:30:11] So beyond that, it's important to have a sense of perspective, right. We are fighting for the survival of our people. We are fighting to ensure that our children grow up in a better world than the one that we currently have. We are fighting to ensure that our children do not grow up in a clown world, right, I don't have kids, but my hypothetical future children sure as hell better have something better than what I have today. I mean personally I have an alright life. There's a lot of lot of uncertainty. It's not exactly normal but it's, it's interesting at the very least and I have tons of good friends and, and so forth, so I'm not complaining about me personally so much,, but yeah we don't want our kids to have to worry about just fighting for survival, right. We don't want, we want them to grow up in a society where, like, the great debates are over just, you know, I don't know, ethanol subsidies or something like that. So how do we do that, right? Well we have to make a stand. We have to have at least some of us go out into public, create public displays of

defiance against the powers that be. We have to engage in activism, lawful and peaceful activism, to call into question, in public, the legitimacy of the current ruling class and their sick ruling ideology, but because there is a soft totalitarianism that stifles dissent it shuts people up, that is why it is so powerful for us to go out there and to do this. Believe me, there are many people, names you would recognize, larger names too, who support what we are doing, and they recognize that we are making a heroic stand against those powerful people, in the western world if not the world overall. Because make no mistake, we are absolutely threatening the interests of elites, legally and nonviolently threatening them I should add, and that's why we're even more of a threat, because if we were engaging in acts of violence, if we were engaging in illegal activity, it would be very easy for them to shut us down and they would love for us to be doing that, right. For all the lamentation over, oh right wing violence is so bad, we've got to stop it, the left doesn't want it to stop. The left wants people on the right to be violent, because that is how the establishment knows how to deal with these people, where we, by these people I mean people who are dissenting, right, they know how to deal with violence. They know how to deal with illegal activity because this classical liberal system based around the rule of law is already set up to deal with people who are violent and illegal but unfortunately for the powers that be and their, their sadistic and subversive plans for the future, it's actually not illegal to have the wrong opinion and that is why they resort to the dehumanization to the unpersoning, to the going after someone's employer, which by the way, by the way, that does not mean when someone gets fired for having the wrong opinion, that is nine times out of ten, that does not mean that their employer is so disgusted that they have to let him go. No, our people are more often than not the best among their co-workers and their peers. Right. So what that means is that people's employers kind of don't have a choice. Sure they have a choice but it's the kind of thing of you know if you give someone a choice between firing someone, firing someone or having their business destroyed through a massive mass media PR campaign, yeah, which will, which do you think they're going to choose, which do you think they're going to choose. It's almost an odd choice. So regardless of how quote unquote based your boss is, more or less, you know, more often than not, they crack under pressure. Now sometimes with these doxes you see that someone gets doxed and then it kind of disappears, right, there, people forget about it. So keep that in mind, that the eye of Sauron is one of the most powerful forces right. It's an unprecedented amount of force. It is an unprecedented power, the ability to direct the anger of the mob at a certain business,, to certain individuals very powerful. So again, even if an employer says, well I, even if I don't disagree, even if I don't agree with this person's identitarian views, they're a law abiding citizen, and they, you know, they're, they're, they're just, well, within their constitutional right. Well, you know, you're going to have multiple articles come out, activist campaigns and so forth. So it is system mandated that people with our views are unemployable. Now again, it doesn't always work out. And, you know, more often than not people, people almost basically always bounce back question of how long. But there is a system mandate that says that employers don't have the choice. This is what to keep in mind because you have people on the fake right and the Left in general who argue for things, you know, they make the case that well, you know, people lose their jobs because racism is bad and society sees it as bad. So no one wants to hire a racist, it's... no no no. I have seen this dynamic play out and I think we all know that that is not the case. It is something far deeper because this apparatus of social control that exists, that has been created to keep us confined, to keep us silent and afraid, has to find extralegal ways to deal with dissent. That is exactly what we see with the doxing, with the dehumanization, the unpersoning.

[00:35:48] But you know what? These strategies only embolden people. They only strengthen their convictions. It might scare some people off from participating. Sure sure.

But I can tell you that the most dedicated people, the kind of people that we need to win over, Are not going to be turned off by this. Even if they get doxed, and they have to find a new job, even if they decide they can't do activism, this doesn't kill their beliefs. This doesn't convince them that they're doing the wrong thing. If anything it convinces them of the contrary, to find out that though society says you can't have these views, society says that if you believe that it's okay to be white, you're a hateful terrible person who needs to be rendered unemployable. That's not the kind of thing that convinces people that, well, hell, you know, I've been doing it wrong, right, I've had, I've had all these bigoted views, now I need to fully integrate into a society that says that my existence is not OK. No, that doesn't happen. And that is why I truly believe that while these things are obstacles to us, that while this soft totalitarianism is absolutely a thorn in our side, it is not going to stop us, right, it cannot stop us because in order to stop us, it would have, would have to kill the strength of our convictions. And as I said before, disgusting and unjust behavior has the opposite effect. So keep that in mind. Keep that in mind when you get disillusioned about hearing that someone got doxed.

[00:37:27] You need to have that perspective and you also need to have the perspective of what our ancestors endured, right, in order for you to get here today. Thousands if not millions of billions of people in the past had to endure far worse than finding a new job, right, far worse than that. Our ancestors endured starvation, famine, now imagine if everyone you know is dying of, dying of starvation right, that's horrific. It's hellish. Imagine the same for people dying of disease, to see all of your, all of your loved ones, everyone you've come to know in your small village, just wither away covered in pestilence, boils, and so forth. Right. That's no good. But people kept on, People didn't give up, right. Look at what, you know, people people fighting for for labor rights in this country, regardless of what you think about that. Although I would say that back in the day, I think it was pretty clear cut that the worker was getting absolutely screwed over by industrialists and so forth. They were risking getting shot in the face and in many times they did get shot in the face by these big bosses right, wealthy industrialists and so forth, they kept doing, they kept going, right, because they understood that the only way out is through. And that is the only way out for us as well, is going through this. We cannot delude ourselves into thinking that someone's going to come along and make it better. Right. There's a good chance that someone can come along and make things a little better. But we're going to have to do everything that we can and we cannot simply sit back and say well someone's going to come along. Trump's going to come along and take it right. I heard a lot of that during 2018. Oh there's no need to do activism, there's not need to network, Trump's, Trump's doing great. Trump's doing great. Trump is not doing great. And I think everyone gets that now, right, there's some people that was thinking, they were thinking Andrew Yang is going to come along, he's going to give us a thousand dollars per month for a birthright, that's pretty epic, that's, that's what it costs for me to, to tune out and accept my demographic dispossession. Well, you know, Yang is not going anywhere, and while I think under better governance, perhaps under identitarian or nationalistic governance, I wouldn't be opposed to UBI at all, particularly if it does, if it replaced the absurdly bloated welfare state that we have now. But that's beside the point. The point is looking for the next meme candidate to come along and save us is not not the way that we have to do things. We are going to have to continue building our social capital. We're going to have to continue building up our networks. Guys, there are many ways that these networks could come in handy in the future. There was a window of opportunity in 2016 where forces on the mainstream right who had serious serious connections, were very interested, and in the human capital that the alt-right had amassed, right, the individual, the skilled educated talented individuals that had come together under the alt-right banner. Well, what happened that, what happened to that? "Hail Trump, hail our people, hail victory." That is

exactly what happened to that. The sheer, the extent to which that drunken gaffe ruined the prospects of, ruined the potential for the alt-right to turn into something that could have institutional power, that could whisper in the ears of wealthy powerful elites, cannot be overstated. Cannot be overstated. It was, that killed the alt-right, the alt-right, it took until basically Charlottesville for the alt-right to officially die, and now by the alt-right I mean that particular term and brand. If you still use the term alt-right, which I would hope you don't, to refer to this area of the Overton Window of the political spectrum, then sure obviously, interest in these views has only grown. But I would, I would argue that the term dissident right is better, right, isn't linked to any individual failed narcissists. It is, it is a term that, you know, some perhaps have used more than others, but it's nevertheless something that, you know, and it really does cut to the core of what we are. We are on the right, even if you favor socialist policies and you're less bothered about things by, you're socially liberal as an identitarian, sure, that's, that's a position you could have I suppose. We're on the right, and we're on the right because what is considered right-wing at a point in time is largely historically contextual, right. There has been a leftward shift since basically the French Revolution that, or you could argue, basically since the Enlightenment, we could say, but it, really, the French Revolution is really kind of the turning point there. There has been a leftward shift, a shift away from order towards entropy, towards, moving away from whatever it is viewed as reactionary, beourgouise, traditional, and so forth. And that has been, that, there is a point in time where you could, yeah, I mean the French, maybe, maybe there are points you know, 100, 200 years ago you could go back to and say OK, this is, this, that was good, right, even though it wasn't, you know, even though it was fairly, it was classic, it was classical liberal, it wasn't, you know, as right wing as other factions at the time, it was still, you know, it was still for white people, right. Sure. And I'm not going to totally disagree. [00:42:57] I mean America basically up until the Civil War was pretty awesome. [3.2s] It was pretty awesome, wasn't perfect. But we're not going to have to wind back the clock. That's something to keep back and something to keep in the back of your head. But the point is is to be right wing is to recognize your point in history. Are you someone who says yes, this left wing shift should continue, right. If you have, if you're a liberal, maybe you want to say, oh, well, let's move it a little bit to the left. Right, well, we don't want to, you know, institute communism, but at the same time, when we want to. want there to be more, we want minorities to have more welfare. So I'm sure if you're conservative you say oh, this, this leftward shift, it's no good, we should we should go back 20 years, right. But to be someone who gets it, you understand you have to stop the process altogether. Now how that happens is a subject for much debate. Moldbug had some interesting ideas there to say the least. But the point is, it is, yeah, a lot of people say well, we're not right or left. No we absolutely are. But we shouldn't be cartoonishly and stereotypically right wing, we should be open to recruiting from the left. We should be open to non-libertarian economic positions while at the same time being open to people who do have more conservative libertarian leanings on economics. Absolutely. So just important to keep that mind, is there's still every now and then I hear from people all about right wing. Well you're on the right. Right. But there was, it was, was there any doubt as to whether or not you going be voting for Donald Trump in the 2016 election? Probably not. Probably not. You know, if you don't consider yourself right wing while you were, you know head over heels for the guy that people on the left were describing as, you know, this far right extremist tyrant, basically. So yes. So what.

[00:44:44] One more thing to keep in mind, there is, you know, it's, basically, what I was saying before is we want to understand where we are. But at the same time it's important to keep in mind that right and left kind of function as a club. The Left in particular functions as a club. That is why they have far more rigid standards. They will let you know if you're a heretic or not. So leftism basically does a good job 'cause the left just wants power. They

want power to continue ensuring that the leftward shift continues. And so today they have more of an insular kind of quality, right, there's a lot of squabbling within the left, sure, but it's like, I mean for example, look at it this way, you have, you know, Adolf Hitler is, by Jonah Goldberg and many National Review types, they try to make him out to be a leftist. Sure, fascism and national socialism had the left wing elements, right, they have some socialistic elements, but there was never any doubt to, you know, communists, where the National Socialists and the Italian fascists stood. Now we are neither fascist nor national socialist. Obviously we are American nationalists and identitarians. But it's just important to keep that in mind. I want you to conceive of the left as kind of a club. They have very high standards to get in in terms of ideology. Right you have to, you have to drink the Kool-Aid and so forth. So that's why you see centrists at the same time, like, you know, Tim Pool or others being lumped in with us. And it actually forces them our way, right, Sargon of Akkad used to be far more of a centrist than he is now. That's because a lot has been made it clear, you made it clear that you're going to be an unperson, you're either with us or against us. That's kind of the best way for the left to be understood.

[00:46:34] But anyways guys we know what we need to do. We need to have revolutionary discipline. We need to have a revolutionary mentality, right. This is not, well, for many of us, this is just going to be a club to hang out with others of like minded. That's OK. We have to understand that we are fighting for something, that is the most important thing. That's why all of you are here. So we are going to have to take risks. Sure, we could just stop doing this and hope someone comes along. But are you gonna be able to look your kid in the eye in 20 years and say hey, I, you know, I just kind of gave up, I gave up. I saw people getting doxed. I gave up, right. The show was gonna go on one way or another. You know applications after the IE leaks, right, for AIM, have been higher than they were under the previous organization. The people were bringing in are top notch. Absolutely. And I can say that the chapters that have the strongest bonds of brotherhood and fellowship righ, where it's not just, you know, oh, I've seen this guy for two hours a month for the last three months. Now when you're getting together at least once a week, you're good friends with people, right, maybe your wives are friends or girlfriends are friends. These are the kinds of communities that are going to last. These are the kinds of communities that haven't seen huge departures as a result of the leaks, right. And that's why the community stuff is very important. It keeps people in. And to be able to have a big social support network after you get, you know,, if you get doxed or if something else happens, is, is huge, right, we've been able to get people who got doxed as a result of the leaks jobs in the movement. We need more of that. We need more of that. So recruit your friends and family who are of like mind to the organization, assuming they're up to standards as well, as we need to build up our networks as big as possible. I think that once we've won this, we'll look back on the networks more than anything else and say this is really what what did it, but the activism, it's a great way to spread our message. It's something that we absolutely need to do more of. I want, I've been trying to encourage the broader right to do more of as well. I'd like to see people mobilize the energy of Trump and then get, you know, hundreds of thousands of people doing acts of civil disobedience, perhaps big protest demonstrations, swarming congressman's office demanding action on things like censorship, right. Unfortunately most on the alt-lite at this point don't seem terribly interested. I don't know why. I understand people are busy but this stuff is very important, but the activism is important. It's, it's absolutely indispensable. The networking is as well. So you need to find a good niche for yourself, right, I've got people in my local chapter who can't really do much activism, guess what, they're at every meetup, every meetup. That's fantastic. I'm at basically every meetup as well so I deserve a little credit too. But you know, it's part of my job. I'm not doing it though because I have to, I'm doing it because it's, you know, I enjoy it. Absolutely.

Maybe there are ways around that,, I don't know and we're strongly patrolling the personal information. So even if you're, even if you're not too concerned about offering up personal anecdotes about your life, don't do it, because we don't want to have an environment in which everyone's doing it thinking it's OK. So please just keep that in mind, and I will be harsh about this. I will be harsh in a non-mean way if that makes any sense, because it is that important, when people get doxed, it does, it does kind of harm morale, right. So we can't have that happening. But anyways, guys, they're not going to stop us. We're gonna keep going even if we have to adjust strategy, whatever, we're going to see this thing through to the end until we win. So thank you.
