

**Responses to Questions from June 5, 2020
Letter from Senator Kamala Harris, et al**

1. How do your agencies track requests for assistance or resources, including both requests for personnel and equipment?

A detailed summary of the request is submitted to CBP Headquarters from CBP's regional Field Offices and Sectors.

a. What is the approval process for such requests?

Operational leadership determines if the support requested is feasible and if resources are available to support federal, state, or local law enforcement. All support requests require approval from the Chief of Law Enforcement Operations and the Deputy Chief or their designee.

b. Who at your agencies is responsible for approving such requests?

Each operational office has its own approval process for requests. For instance, in the U.S. Border Patrol (USBP), Sector Chiefs may approve the requests in the field. At Headquarters, the Chief or Deputy Chief of Operations, or their designee, may approve USBP support requests. As for Office of Field Operations (OFO),.

c. Have your agencies deployed personnel or equipment to any jurisdictions that did not request assistance?

No, CBP has only deployed assets and resources as requested.

d. Have any state or local entities requested that you not deploy personnel or equipment in response to the demonstrations?

Not that we are aware of, no.

2. Has anyone at your agencies discussed these deployments with anyone at the White House? If so, please specify the individual with whom anyone at your agency spoke and the name of the agency official(s) that participated in the conversation.

CBP defers to DHS to address this question as it coordinated component efforts with the White House.

3. As of the date of your response, how many total personnel has each of your agencies deployed?

Between May 31 and June 11, 2020 (the final day of our deployments), CBP deployed 2,174 personnel and the following assets: 1 Bearcat, 50 marked vehicles, 52 unmarked vehicles, 2 ATVs, and 3 vessels to assist with civil disturbance throughout the National Capital Region and the United States.

4. As of the date of your response, have any of your agencies' "aviation assets" been deployed in connection with demonstrations:

Between May 29 and June 10, 2020, CBP deployed the following aviation assets: 38 rotor wing, 8 fixed wing, and 2 Unmanned Aircraft Systems. CBP's flight operations devoted 326.4 flight hours to assist with civil disturbance throughout the National Capital Region and the United States.

- a. What individuals or entity requested the deployment, including whether it was state or local law enforcement.**

Law enforcement that have requested aerial assistance include: Aurora Police Department, Chicago Police Department, Val Verde County, Detroit Police Department, Philadelphia Police Department, Uvalde Police Department, Homeland Security Investigations, United States Secret Service, Department of Justice, and [D.C.] Metro Police Department.

- b. The location, duration, and nature of the deployment.**

The locations of these deployments have been in the following states: Illinois, New York, Ohio, Texas, Michigan, California, Florida, Minnesota, Pennsylvania and Washington, DC. The total duration from May 29, 2020 – July 10, 2020 is 326.4 total operational hours. The nature of these deployments were based on the requests. The agency conducts aviation and marine operations in support of federal, state, local, tribal, and international law enforcement agencies pursuant to 6 U.S.C. § 211(f)(3)(C). Appropriations for these activities are specifically made available within CBP's Operations and Support account. See Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2020, P.L. 116-93, Div. D, Title II.

- c. What, if any, surveillance capabilities were utilized?**

CBP's aircrafts can be equipped with cameras, radar, and/or other technologies to support CBP components in patrolling the border, conducting surveillance as part of a law enforcement investigation or tactical operations, and responding to other significant incidents as directed.

- d. Whether any footage obtained by the aviation assets are being shared with local, state, or federal agencies for law enforcement purposes.**

Footage from AMO aircraft systems is not shared with other law enforcement agencies, unless needed for an investigation or in connection with a law enforcement activity. Requests for footage must be processed, reviewed, and approved before dissemination by the CBP Office of Intelligence's Production, Exploitation, and Dissemination Cell.

5. What uniforms, identification, and equipment will personnel participating in these deployments wear and carry? Please provide any relevant policies and procedures with your response.

While uniform policies slightly differ between CBP components, common requirements are found in each component uniform policies. The policies require the use of identifiable agency uniforms with badging and name tapes on the outermost garment (e.g. jacket, body armor). Additionally, the CBP Use of Force Policy, Guidelines, and Procedures Handbook¹ governs the carriage of specified equipment, while in uniform. These equipment carriage requirements are as follows:

- CBP law enforcement personnel are required to carry a CBP-issued handgun during duty hours while performing uniformed law enforcement duties, except when operational circumstances preclude the carriage of a firearm (e.g., when operating in restricted areas);
- CBP law enforcement personnel, when in uniform and on-duty, shall carry a minimum of two, fully loaded, spare magazines for their primary handgun;
- While performing uniformed law enforcement duties, CBP law enforcement personnel who carry firearms are required to carry either OC Spray or a Collapsible Straight Baton;
- CBP law enforcement personnel may carry additional firearms and/or less-lethal devices for which they are certified to carry (e.g. tasers, pressurized air launchers); and
- Additional equipment appropriate for the situation to protect self and/or others may be utilized (e.g. shields, helmets).

6. ICE has stated that it “fully respects the rights of all people to peacefully express their opinions” and CBP has stated that it “support[s] those who participate in lawful protests.” How have you defined these standards, and what training have your personnel received regarding the standards that they are required to apply?

CBP is committed to the fair, impartial and respectful treatment of all members of the trade and traveling public, and has memorialized its commitment to nondiscrimination in existing policies. CBP adheres closely to the May 2019 DHS Memorandum, Information Regarding First Amendment Protected Activities. Pursuant to that policy:

DHS personnel shall not collect maintain in DHS systems, or use information protected by the First Amendment unless (a) an individual has expressly granted their consent for DHS to collect, maintain and use that information; (b) maintaining the record is expressly authorized by a federal statute; or (c) that information is relevant to a criminal, civil or administrative activity relating to a law DHS enforces or administers. In addition, DHS personnel should not pursue by questioning research or other means information relating to how an individual exercises his or her First Amendment rights unless one or more of the same conditions applies.

CBP recognizes the sacred duty to uphold the First Amendment, and “that the privilege of administering and enforcing federal laws carries with it the responsibility for upholding the principles of professionalism, impartiality, courtesy, and respect for civil rights and civil liberties.”

CBP officers and agents receive training regarding Constitutional Law at the CBP Basic Training Academies. Additionally, the CBP Use of Force Policy, Guidelines and Procedures Handbook, HB 4500-01C clearly states that CBP’s actions are governed by a respect for human life, and that the communities the agency serves shall guide all employees in the performance of their duties. This principle includes the respect and support of the Constitutional rights of those within the United States. CBP law enforcement personnel receive CBP Use of Force Policy training during quarterly training throughout each year.

In support and reinforcement of the training received at the basic academy and reinforced through the Use of Force Policy quarterly training, CBP’s Office of Chief Council provides Civil Response Instruction to responders, designed to emphasize the First Amendment rights and the responsibilities of CBP.

a. Have your personnel received training regarding applicable privacy laws?

Constitutional Law is taught at the CBP Basic Training Academies. All Agents/Officers receive instruction on the Fourth and Fifth Amendments, and the rights they bestow. The CBP Less-Lethal Instructor Training Program (LLITP) is an extension of the training that occurs at the CBP Basic Training Academies, and certifies officers/agents as instructors to conduct on-going, in-service Use of Force training to field personnel. Although students attending the LLITP have already received a foundational understanding of Constitutional Law prior to their attendance in the LESC’s training programs, LESC enhances that

understanding through direct collaboration with Office of Chief Counsel to include an additional, more in depth presentation/discussion of Constitutional rights, focusing specifically on the Fourth amendment.

Additionally, CBP uniformed personnel who are asked to provide assistance are provided additional Civil Unrest Response training on the First Amendment rights of protestors, legal authorities, and the Fourth Amendment, including the legally permissible use of force.

b. Have your personnel received training on the appropriate use of force, including methods of de-escalation?

All CBP officers and agents have received training at the Federal Law Enforcement Training Center (FLETC) and are trained to assist other law enforcement entities in this situation. CBP personnel have received advanced training for operations in chaotic environments such as the ones we saw across the country. Additionally, as per the CBP Use of Force Policy, Guidelines, and Procedures Handbook, all CBP law enforcement personnel continue their use of force training, during designated training periods every year. All CBP use of force training is administered by CBP certified use of force instructors. CBP certified use of force instructors receive training on de-escalation tactics and techniques, and the teaching of said techniques in stand-alone blocks of instruction during their instructor certification courses. De-escalation techniques and tactics are also instructed with device-specific blocks of instruction. CBP's de-escalation techniques and tactics include: performing threat assessments, identifying behaviors of people experiencing various stages of crisis, and the use of safe tactics to attempt to bring all law enforcement encounters to the safest possible law enforcement conclusion for all parties involved.

c. Have your personnel received training regarding the exercise of First Amendment rights, including the freedom of speech and the freedom of assembly?

CBP law enforcement personnel deployed to civil unrest situation are provided legal instruction, which augments CBP's recurring use of force training and serves as a Constitutional Law refresher. This legal briefing, like the CBP's use of force policy, is based off the United States Constitution as well as seminal United States Supreme Court cases. The guidance/analysis in this briefing and the CBP use of force policy make it clear that non-violent, non-aggressive people gathering are invoking their First Amendment rights.

CBP uniformed personnel who are asked to provide assistance are also provided additional Civil Unrest Response training on the First Amendment rights of protestors, legal authorities, and the Fourth Amendment, including the legally permissible use of force.

7. What forms of force are your personnel authorized to utilize as part of these deployments?

The CBP Use of Force Policy, Guidelines, and Procedures Handbook, the United States Constitution, and seminal United States Supreme Court cases concerning uses of force – regardless of mission – govern all uses of force by CBP law enforcement personnel. This policy clearly states

that authorized Officers/Agents may use objectively reasonable force only when it is necessary to carry out their law enforcement duties.

8. Please provide any guidance that you distributed to your personnel reflecting your public statements that your agencies are not conducting immigration-related activities, including a detailed description of any training received by personnel, relating to questions (a) and (b) below.

a. Please confirm that both of your agencies will not conduct immigration enforcement activities, including referrals for immigration enforcement, at protests and demonstrations.

These deployments were about supporting the efforts of our federal, state and local partners, not about carrying out CBP's immigration enforcement mission. Our efforts are directed at the preservation of life and safety. Beyond that, CBP has not made any additional comments/statements to this effort. Thus, CBP has no additional information to provide with respect to this question and the sub-questions.

b. To the extent that protests and demonstration may occur at or near sensitive locations, such as churches, schools, medical facilities, and community centers, please confirm that your agencies will not conduct immigration enforcement activity of any kind at these locations.

Service authority

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C.F.R. Subpart C – Conduct on Federal Property; 41); and 28 C.F.R. § 0.112(b) – Authority of US Marshals Service to cross-designate federal officers with special deputy status

a. Do your agencies intend to invoke authority to conduct interrogations and arrests pursuant to 8 U.S.C. § 1357(a) without warrants, including arrests for “any offense against the United States, if the offense is committed in the officer’s or employee’s presence” in connection with these deployments?

No, the arrest authority in that statute requires Officers/Agents to be “performing duties related to the enforcement of the immigration laws at the time of the arrest.” CBP officers/agents also have the authority, pursuant to 19 U.S.C. § 1589a, to arrest for any federal crime committed in the officer/agent’s presence or for federal felonies if the officer/agent has reasonable grounds to believe the person has committed such felony. This Title 19 authority does not require officers/agents to otherwise be enforcing a specific law.

In some locations, CBP was cross-designated by Federal Protective Service (FPS) to enforce the Federal Property Management regulations related to conduct on federal property. In addition, while providing support to the National Capital Region, the U.S. Marshals Service (USMS) granted special deputy status to federal officers and agents to further USMS federal law enforcement functions.

10. Are your agencies collecting any personally identifiable information regarding the individuals attending demonstrations, either in person or via other methods of surveillance?

No personally identifiable information regarding the individuals attending demonstrations was collected by CBP.

11. What if any methods of surveillance do your agencies intend to use in connection with these deployments, including but not limited to cell site simulators or facial recognition technology?

Basic open source/social media research techniques were used to identify ongoing and planned protests. CBP does not use or have access to cell site simulator technology. In addition, no facial recognition capabilities were used by CBP to support these efforts.

12. Are your agencies’ intelligence units collecting, sharing, or disseminating intelligence information related to the protests?

CBP utilized open source reporting to collect information of the protests and evaluated how they may impact CBP operations. This information was provided to CBP operational offices.
